KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

What to Do if You Are Questioned, Arrested or Detained by Immigration and Other Law Enforcement

Who might ask me about my immigration status?

- Any law enforcement officer could ask you questions about your background, immigration status, family, or coworkers. This includes immigration officers, local police, state police, and federal agents.
- When people talk about "Immigration," they usually mean Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) or Customs and Border Protection (CBP).
 - ICE handles immigration enforcement inside the U.S.
 - CBP is in charge at the border.
- ICE agents might dress like regular police officers by wearing badges or uniforms. They might even call themselves "police."

What should I do if Immigration or other law enforcement talks to me on the street?

- **Stay quiet.** You have the right to *remain silent*. You don't have to answer questions about where you were born, where you live, where you're from, or if you have immigration papers.
 - o If you have already started answering, you can stop at any time.
 - Never lie about your immigration status—it can get you in serious trouble.
- **Ask for a lawyer.** You don't have to talk about your background or immigration status until you speak to a lawyer.
- **Show your papers if you have them.** If you have immigration documents, you should carry them and show them when asked.
 - If you don't have documents, you can refuse to answer questions about your status.

What should I do if Immigration comes to my door?

- Check the warrant. If it's not signed by a judge, you don't have to let them in. You can say:
 - "I don't want to talk right now."
 - "I do not have to let you in."
- **Do not sign anything.** This includes any documents like an "order of voluntary departure."
- **Don't share personal details.** Don't tell them where you were born or how you entered the U.S.

What can parents do?

- Make a plan for your children's care.
 - Keep a list of important documents for your kids.
 - Pick someone you trust to care for your children if you can't.
 - Fill out a "Caregiver" affidavit so another adult can care for your kids temporarily.
- Keep an immigration lawyer's phone number handy.
